

PHRASAL VERBS WITH 'LET'

phrasal verb	meaning	example
let down	disappoint someone or make clothes longer	Mum, my trousers need letting down. All the other kids are laughing at me.
let in	allow someone to enter	I was too drunk, so the bouncers didn't let me in.
let in on	tell someone the secret	I'll let Tina in on the surprise party idea. She is good at organising things.
let off	not punish	Parker didn't play well today. The fans let him off as his ankle is still sore.
let on	allow something to be known	I didn't let on to Millie about the pregnancy.
let out	allow someone/something to leave or make a sound	The audience let out a huge gasp as the stuntman attempted to swallow a sword.
let up	stop or become less intense	I wish Anton would let up talking about his new girlfriend, it's getting boring now.
