idiom	meaning	example
blossom into	grow/mature into something prettier/more successful/more confident	Our decade long friendship blossomed into a beautiful romance.
come into bloom	start to produce flowers	You need to wait a few more months. These flowers don't come into bloom until July.
come into fashion	become fashionable	I'm going to keep all my old clothes. One day they'll come back into fashion.
drum something into someone's head	tell/teach by frequently repeating until you remember/understand	Miss has drummed all the formulas into our heads ready for the test.
get into the swing of things	become accustomed to/comfortable with something	I've been in my new job for a few weeks now. I'm just starting to get into the swing of things.
get one's teeth into something	get involved in a project/job/task etc. with great determination and effort	I really got my teeth into renovating the house. I can't wait to do it again.
go into overdrive	start working very quickly	We've got two books being released this week. Our printers have gone into overdrive.
kick into touch	stop something happening/succeeding	Our plans for a new home have been kicked into touch now I'm unemployed.
knock someone into the middle of next week	hit someone very hard	If you hurt my sister, I'll knock you into the middle of next week.
lull into a false sense of security	make someone believe everything is ok, then attack	The cheering crowd lulled her into a false sense of security. She was voted out first.
marry into money	marry a rich person	I don't need to study, I'm going to marry into money.
out of the frying pan, into the fire	from a bad situation to an even worse situation	I left my abusive husband, now I'm homeless. Out of the frying pan, into the fire.
put one's back into it	use a lot of effort/force	The jar is a bit tight, put your back into it.
put one's heart and soul into something	apply maximum effort, energy, enthusiasm, passion etc.	Lexi put her heart and soul into that assignment, but the teacher only gave her a C.
put words into someone's mouth	inaccurately report what someone has said	The journalist put words in my mouth. I didn't say any of those horrible things.
rolled into one	several components combined into one	I'm a writer, actor, singer and comedian all rolled into one.
talk someone into	persuade someone to do something	We need to talk Alex into driving us to that rave in Bristol.
vanish into thin air	completely disappear	I saw Carly in the bar but then she vanished into thin air.
